
Give us this day our daily bread (Matthew 6:11)

- God's curse on Adam included *By the sweat of your face You will eat bread, Till you return to the ground...* (Genesis 3:19).


So, does our food come from us or God?

Since becoming a Christian, I have tried diligently to keep the Lord's example of praying before meals. I raised my family in this tradition and have been happy to see it passed on in the families of my children. But Christ also tells us to specifically ask the Father to give



We expect that the farmer, the butcher, the grocery store, the government, and others will produce and provide food. But what if we arrive at the store and there's no food to buy? What if there's nothing in the pantry or the garden? Consider the once rich nation of Venezuela, where almost overnight the people are starving. The "New York Times" reported in February 2019:

Venezuela is on the brink. Grocery shelves lie empty as food becomes increasingly scarce and expensive. People are fleeing the country at re-



cord rates, flooding neighboring countries. Inflation is set to reach 10 million percent in 2019.

The truth is that the world's food is supplied by God, not man. God provides it as He sees fit and is under no obligation to us. I suggest Jesus is reminding us of this very fact in Matthew 6:11. It's His land, His weather, His processes (germination, photosynthesis, the water cycle, etc.) which produces the food we live on.

Notice what God said through the prophet Jeremiah to the nation of Judah, after having become idolatrous. They do not say in their heart, Let us now fear the LORD our God, Who gives rain in its season, Both the autumn rain and the spring rain, Who keeps for us The appointed weeks of the harvest (Jeremiah 5:24).

We should never become complacent and dishonor God by taking His mercies for granted. Work doesn't feed people, food feeds people. We work to get food, but the food comes from God.

Teaching us to ask God for our daily food gets to the heart of the matter. It reminds us that our daily lives in this physical world depend solely upon the grace of Almighty God above.
