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Idolatry Within the Inner Court from Ezekiel 8By Dave DeWitt

Verses 7-13 — **Dig through the wall.** God brought Ezekiel to the entrance to the court, probably the inner court. He told Ezekiel to dig *through the wall*. And when he *entered and looked*, ... *every form of creeping things and beasts and detestable things* [perhaps meaning unclean animals— Leviticus 11] *were carved on the wall all around* (see Deuteronomy 4:15-19). *Standing in front of them* [indicating worship] *were seventy elders of the house of Israel*. When Moses appointed assistants to help him in leading the people, the number God consecrated was 70 (Numbers 11:16-17). So this number must have continued. These are the official leadership of the people in Jerusalem.

With Jaazaniah the son of Shaphan standing among them. Shaphan's forefather, Shaphan found the book of the Law in Josiah's time, which resulted in nationwide reform (2 Kings 22:3-13). So Ezekiel seems surprised to see Jaazaniah the son of Shaphan worshipping the idols because he came from a godly family. The significant point is that specific bad leaders are mentioned by name.

Today we might say of our churches and para-church groups:

- Dig through the wall and you will see they justify divorce
- Dig through the wall and you will see women clergy
- Dig through the wall and you will see they justify their children being homosexuals
- Dig through the wall and you will see them practicing karate and yoga
- Dig through the wall and you will see them reading their horoscope
- Dig through the wall and you will see them cohabitating outside of marriage
- Dig through the wall and you will see them lying to their customers
- Dig through the wall and you will find them having their own visions
- Dig through the wall and you will find them ignorant about the Word of God

Verses 14-15—Women worshiping Tammuz. Then He brought me to the entrance of the gate of the LORD's house—we're moving toward the Temple, which you would expect would be in a direction toward God. But not so. Here we see the paganism is not hidden but overt. Women were sitting there weeping for Tammuz. I don't know what they were weeping about, but this is a Babylonian idol/god being worshipped on Judean soil!!!.

Verse 16— Men worshiping the sun. In the inner court ... at the entrance to the Temple...between the porch and the altar—the area near the bronze altar, on which sacrifices were offered, were about twenty-five men—they could be the same as the ones that were called "elders" in 9:6. The front door of the Temple faced east, toward the rising of the sun (worship condemned in Deuteronomy 4:19). **Verses 17-18—** My eye will have no pity. The abominations were not just in the Temple area but they have filled the land. So God said they provoked Me repeatedly. The last phrase of verse 17, For behold, they are putting the twig to their nose is not clearly understood. Several interpretations have been suggested, but there is no way to be conclusive.

Verse 18 is the point or key verse of chapter 8. This is by several prophets: "And just as He called and they would not listen, so," says the LORD of hosts (Zechariah 7:13; see also Jeremiah 11:11; Micah 3:4; Malachi 1:9).

A Take-Home Point from Chapter 8—I get my take-home point from the last verse of the chapter (verse 18). We should not expect to continue in sin and have God answer our prayers. There is no end to the love of God, but there is an end to an application of the mercy of God. At a certain point, God just gives up on people.

Application—Don't mix Christianity and demonic religious practices – like tai kwon do, karate and yoga or astrology. **What ended God's patience with Israel was when they brought the idols of the religions of the world into His temple**. Beware of doing this in our churches and with our Christian congregations!
